Intervenors are trained professionals who help facilitate communication, access, and participation in all parts of daily life for people who are Deafblind.

They are narrators, informers, guides, and communicators. Taking direction from the person who is Deafblind, intervenors help enable communication and provide information about the physical environment.

Intervenor services can be used to assist people who are Deafblind with...

Facilitating communication

Like translators, intervenors aid in communication, enabling access to community activities like banking, shopping and more.

Access to information

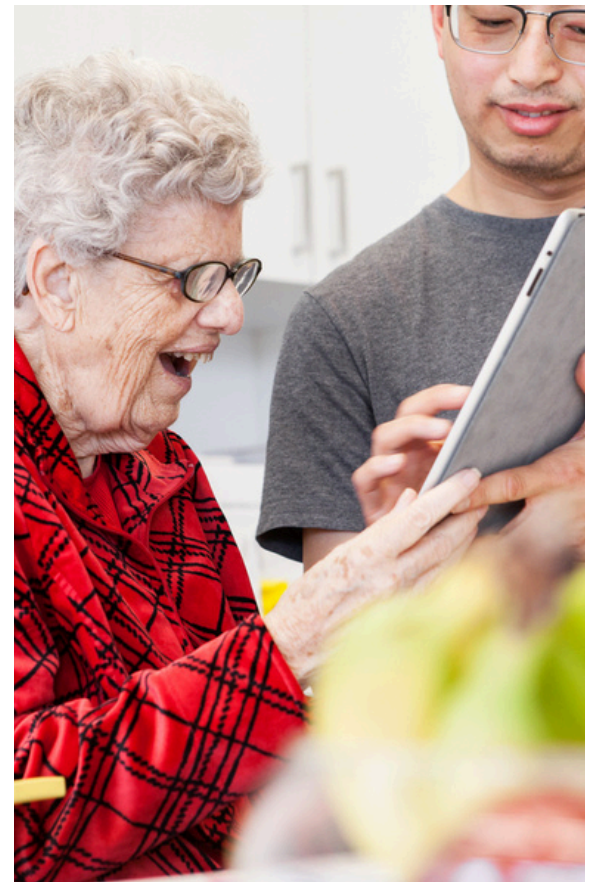
Intervenors ensure access to accurate information to enable other to make informed decisions, especially during important appointments, like doctor's appointments or while financial planning.

Building independence

Intervenors can provide guidance and information to empower individuals to develop their independent living skills - from navigating transport, finances, purchases, to medication management.
